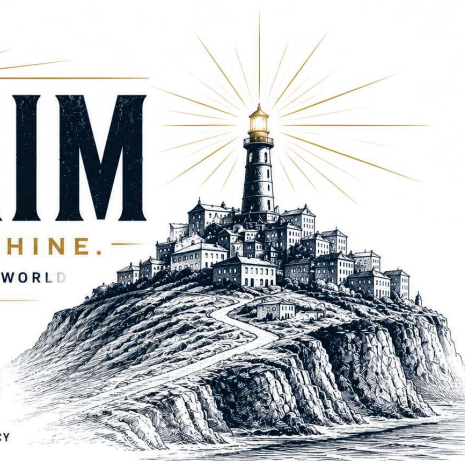

Welcome to Ohio Brigade Camp

We are so excited you could join us here at Ohio Brigade Camp. It is a place of beauty and adventure and a place dedicated to sharing the Gospel of Jesus Christ with all those that visit. Joe Coughlin, along with a group of young Frontiersmen from across the country (with several members from Goss Memorial Church), held the first Brigade Camp in Ohio in 1945. The Milner family caught the vision and, in 1947, purchased the property which became known as Stony Glen. Ohio Brigade Camp has been held each summer at Stony Glen since 1948.

There is something special about being in the great outdoors and experiencing the adventures of Brigade Camp. It has a long history of impacting the families that come here. Some families have been coming here for multiple generations. Maybe you are part of one of those families, or maybe you are a new family and will make this a new tradition.

We hope you will have a chance to gain a new perspective on life. Like the great new experiences of camp, here's a chance to look at the Bible in a fresh new way. Allow the truths of the Bible to give you a fresh view of life and its meaning. **What you get out of camp is what you put into camp.**

What to Expect

Morning Focus

You'll begin each day with the flag raising and then your Morning Focus. This will be your morning devotion time as a family. It is a time for the family to be together with God. Here is what you need:

- Your Bible and Bible X book.
- Read the Bible passage listed in the Bible X book.
- Read the Bible X text.
- Think about what it is teaching.
- Write down any questions you may have.
- Pray.
- Study the Memory Verse.

Group Study

In the afternoon, you will meet with your cabin for a time of Group Study. While it's important to have time alone with God, it's also essential to learn from and with each other. As you engage in each day's mission, share your thoughts and questions with the group. You will probably find that others in the group may have similar ideas and struggles. Here are some important points for the Group Study:

- Bring your Bible and Bible X book.
- This time is for you. What you put in is what you get out.
- Give honest answers and avoid the temptation to say what you think others expect to hear.
- Don't be afraid to express your doubts and questions; that's how a good investigation goes.
- Ask questions. You must be willing to ask tough questions.
- Listen to the answers.
- Be ready to change your mind when presented with truth from God's Word.
- Some questions in this Bible Exploration are personal. You don't need to give your answers out loud.
- Sometimes, though, it's great to share a 'personal' answer.
- Don't ridicule others for their answers. Life is hard; we need to support one another.

You'll probably find that others in the group feel the same way you do. You might even help somebody in his journey through this adventure we call life.

Cabin Devotions

After the campfire, you will have some time to do a short cabin devotion. This is a time as a cabin when you can reflect on what was said during the campfire or recap the day's lessons. Take time to discuss anything that struck you or anyone else in the cabin. This is a great opportunity to discuss how we can apply what we have learned to our personal walk with Christ.

In Congress, July 4, 1776

The unanimous Declaration of the thirteen united States of America,

When in the Course of human events, it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume among the powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the Laws of Nature and of Nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation.

We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness.--That to secure these rights, Governments are instituted among Men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed, --That whenever any Form of Government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the Right of the People to alter or to abolish it, and to institute new Government, laying its foundation on such principles and organizing its powers in such form, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their Safety and Happiness. Prudence, indeed, will dictate that Governments long established should not be changed for light and transient causes; and accordingly all experience hath shewn, that mankind are more disposed to suffer, while evils are sufferable, than to right themselves by abolishing the forms to which they are accustomed. But when a long train of abuses and usurpations, pursuing invariably the same Object evinces a design to reduce them under absolute Despotism, it is their right, it is their duty, to throw off such Government, and to provide new Guards for their future security.--Such has been the patient sufferance of these Colonies; and such is now the necessity which constrains them to alter their former Systems of Government. The history of the present King of Great Britain is a history of repeated injuries and usurpations, all having in direct object the establishment of an absolute Tyranny over these States. To prove this, let Facts be submitted to a candid world.

Day 1 - Morning Study

Read: Matthew 5:14-16

In November 1988, President Ronald Reagan talked about America. He said , “It’s the American vision of creating a new nation of free people, a country that would be a light unto the nations, and a shining city upon a hill.” He was talking about what Jesus said in Matthew 5:14, where Jesus calls His people a light to others.

This idea started even earlier. In 1630, a pastor named John Winthrop said the people coming to America should be like a “city on a hill.” He meant that everyone would be watching them. If they followed God, He would bless them. If they did not follow God, they would fail.

When the Pilgrims and Puritans came to America a long time ago, they wanted to follow God. Because of this, America became a place of freedom and hope. But no country is perfect. People are not perfect, and we all make mistakes. But when a nation truly follows God and makes Christ their King, they can be a light to a world in darkness.

Jesus says in the Bible, “I am the light of the world.” When we follow Him, we are not in darkness anymore. Jesus is the one who gives us light.

God calls us to be a light too. That means we should show others who Jesus is. Our country has a history of sharing the message of Jesus with others. Today, the world is still lost and needs that light.

This week, we will learn from sermons that helped shape our country. These lessons will show us how to follow God and be a light to others.

Winthrop warned that the world would watch how Christians lived in the United States. We can choose to either be a light or to join the darkness. Pray that you will be the light in a dark world.

Day 2 - Morning Study

Read: Luke 12:1-7

America may have begun when the Pilgrims came on the Mayflower in 1620. Later, more people came in 1630. One leader, John Winthrop, said they should live like a “city on a hill” so others could see them follow God.

But about 100 years later, something new happened. The people needed to come back to God. This time was called the First Great Awakening.

During this time, many people went to church just out of habit. They looked good on the outside, but their hearts were not close to God. They talked about being good, but they did not truly follow Him.

Then God raised up preachers to wake people up. One was Jonathan Edwards. Another was George Whitefield. They told people that being “good” was not enough.

They taught that we are saved only by trusting in Jesus. We cannot earn it. We cannot be “good enough.” Salvation is a gift from God.

Today, we will learn from a sermon by Jonathan Edwards called “*Sinners in the Hands of an Angry God*.” It teaches us to take God seriously and to truly follow Him.

Day 3 - Morning Study

Read: John 3:1-15

Jesus once talked to a man named Nicodemus. Jesus told him, “You must be born again to see God’s kingdom.” Nicodemus was confused. Jesus explained that this means being changed on the inside by God’s Spirit.

A long time later, during the First Great Awakening, a preacher named George Whitefield helped people understand this truth.

George Whitefield traveled all over the American colonies. He walked and rode for many miles. He preached to very large crowds. Many people came to hear him speak about Jesus.

His message was simple but powerful. He told people they must truly turn to God. They must repent, which means to turn away from sin. They must trust in Jesus with all their heart.

Whitefield taught that being a Christian is not just about acting better or following rules. It is about a real change inside your heart. This change comes from God, not from us.

Today, we will learn from one of his sermons called “*Repentance and Conversion*.” It will help us understand what it really means to be born again.

From Jonathon Edwards, we learned that we live at the mercy of God because we are sinners and have rebelled against Him. From George Whitefield, we learn that God made a way for us to be reconciled to Him through Jesus Christ. It is more than just being good; it is a change of heart. We are no longer to be self-righteous. We need to be Christ-righteous. If we are to be a “city on a hill” and proclaim the good news to the rest of the world, we must first start with our own hearts.

God does not ask us to become a better version of ourselves. He is offering to make you into a totally new person.

Day 4 - Morning Study

Read: 2 Samuel 23:1-4

The American Revolution was not just about politics. It started with people who believed in God. Many pastors taught these ideas in churches, and the people listened.

A long time ago, many people came to America because they wanted religious freedom. They did not want a king or a pope to tell them how to worship God. They wanted to read the Bible for themselves and follow God as their true King.

Over time, some people began to think faith should stay out of government. But we must ask an important question: Is Jesus Lord over everything? If He is, then He is Lord over every part of life, even government.

The leaders of early America believed this. They first tried to make peace with the King of England. But the king would not listen. He would not give them a voice. So, they chose to stand for freedom.

They believed that no king is above God. True freedom comes from God and His truth.

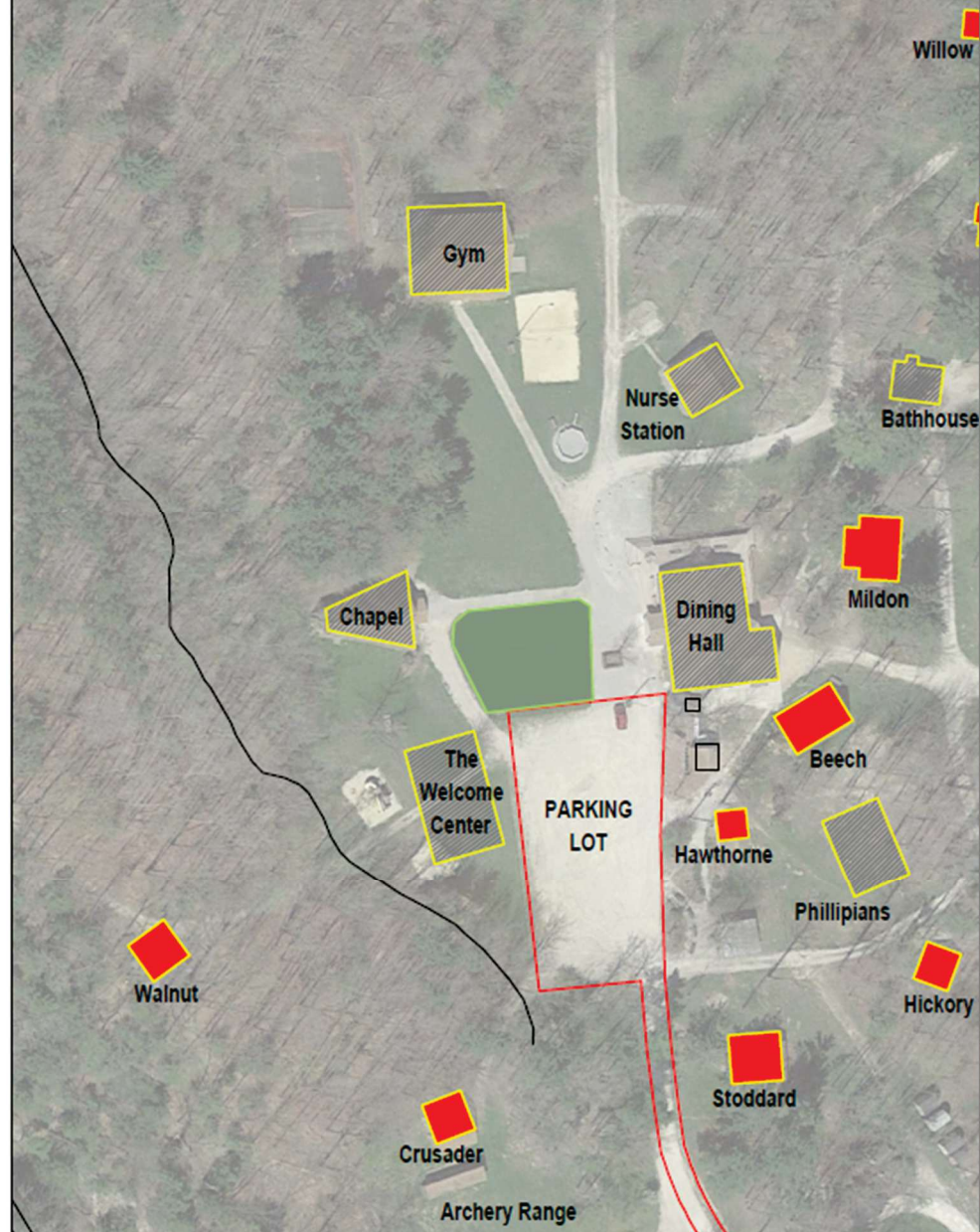

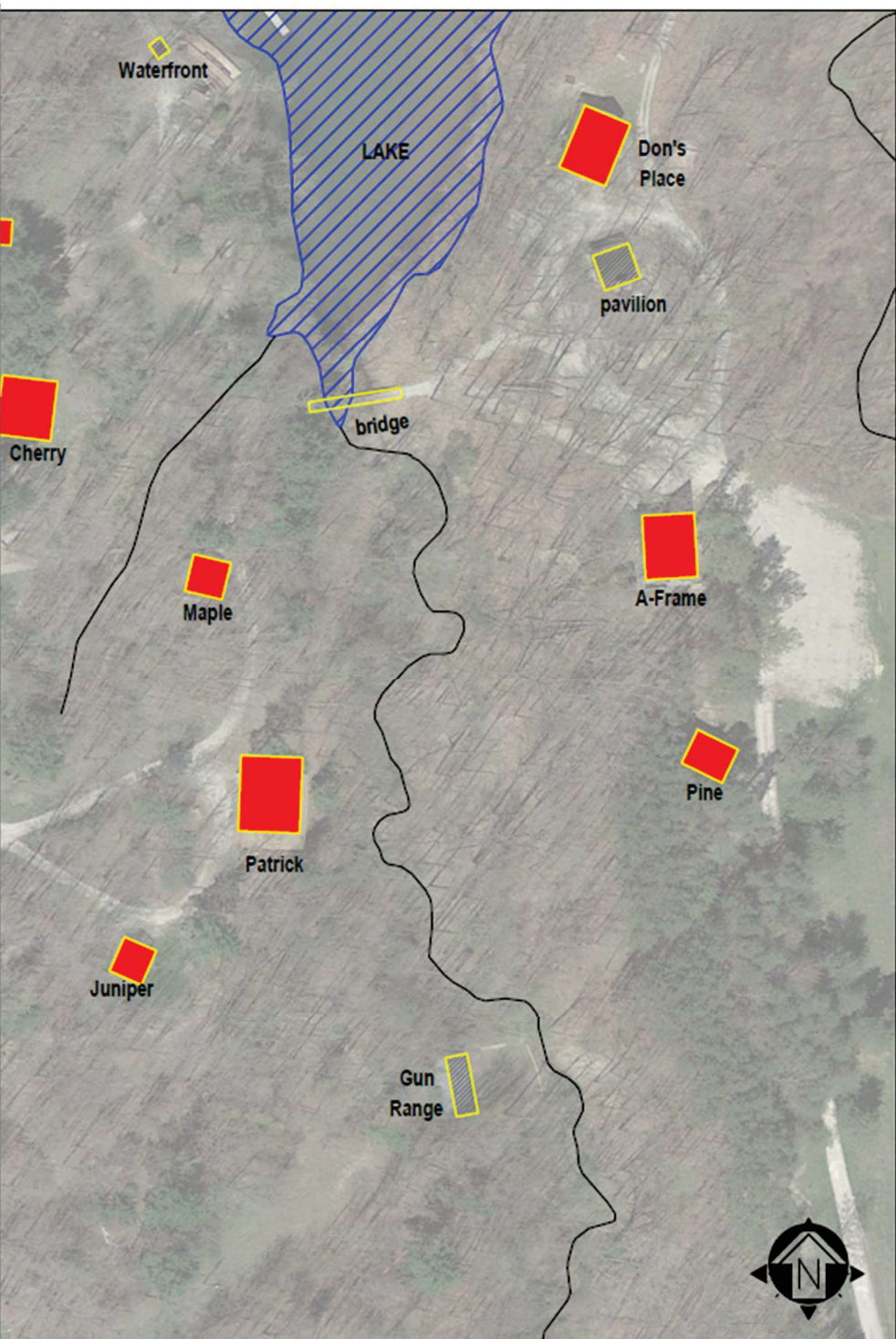

Day 5 - Morning Study

Read: Psalm 76:4-12

Many people know a few names from the Declaration of Independence, like Thomas Jefferson, Benjamin Franklin, and John Adams. But there was another important man named John Witherspoon.

John Witherspoon was a pastor and a teacher. He was the only church leader who signed the Declaration of Independence.

Before the Declaration was signed, he gave a sermon. In this sermon, he taught that God is in control of everything—even when things seem hard or confusing.

Yesterday, we learned that leaders must follow God's truth. A leader is not above the law. God gives leaders their role, and they are supposed to do what is right.

John Witherspoon helped people understand something important. Sometimes we must stand strong, but we must do it the right way. We must trust God, not just our own feelings.

There are times when life does not seem fair. We may think, "God, why did this happen?" But we do not see everything. God sees the whole picture.

The men who started our country trusted God. They risked everything because they believed in Him.

Today, we must ask ourselves: Do we trust God like they did? It may be time to grow our faith again and be a light to others.

He used this message to encourage the American people. He told them to stand for what is right, to thank God for His help, and to stay wise and united.

He also gave clear instructions. He told people to follow God, live good lives, and work hard while using what they have wisely.

Now we need to stop and look at our own lives. We must look at our own hearts.

Day 6 - Morning Study

Read: Isaiah 6:8

America did not begin in just one moment. It was built over many years. Important events helped shape it, like the Magna Carta, the Gutenberg press, the Protestant Reformation, and the Enlightenment.

The freedom we have today is special. For most of history, people have not been free. Many have lived under unfair rulers. Even in America, there have been times when people were treated unfairly.

As Christians, we are called to represent Jesus to the world. That starts with you. You must turn to God and follow Him.

If we want to be a “city on a hill,” we need God’s help. Without Him, nothing we do will last.

Today, we live in a fast and confusing world. It can be hard to tell what is true and what is not. We need God to guide us.

So, grow your faith. Seek God. Love what is true. Love others. Share the message of Jesus.

Be a light and pass the torch to others.

What is God Like

God made you and loves you. He wants you to be His child. But God is perfect and holy. He hates sin and can't even look at it.

What Are We Like

Here's the problem - all of us have sinned. We have all done many wrong things. Sin separates us from God and sin must be punished. "For all have sinned, and come short of the glory of God." (Romans 3:23)

God's Solution

What's the solution? God loved you so much that He gave His only Son, Jesus, to take the punishment for your sin. Instead of punishing you, God punished Jesus. "For God so loved the world, that He gave is only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life." (John 3:16) "For the wages of sin is death; but the gift of God is eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord." (Romans 6:23)

Your Part

What do you have to do? Jesus' death allows you to be friends with God. Here is what you have to do:

1. Believe Jesus died for you personally.
2. Tell Jesus you are sorry for the sin in your life and want to be changed.
3. Ask Jesus to take away your sins and to direct your life.

If you declare with your mouth, "Jesus is Lord," and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved. (Romans 10:9)

When you give your life to Jesus, you become His child and belong to His family! Wow! What could be better?
